#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear CLA Members,

Welcome to Summer! Boats are in the water, seasonal cottages are open, and we are seeing a lot more human activity on and around the lake.

I would like to start by recognizing important milestone: Charleston Lake Environmental Association (CLEA) is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year. Founded in 1999 and established as a Registered Charity, CLEA has undertaken multiple initiatives over the past quarter century to materially improve the environment Charleston Lake and its watershed. Examples include the Stream Rehabilitation program, the Old Baldy nature reserve (in partnership with the Nature Conservancy of Canada), and multiple projects with the Thousand Islands Watershed Land Trust which have placed 100s of hectares around the lake into permanent conservation. Bravo CLEA, and we look forward to the next quarter century!

If you deeply care about the natural environment of our lake, consider joining CLEA's Club 100. This is a group of 100 donors who each agree to donate \$100 to **CLEA to support its activities.** And remember, this \$100 (or more!) is considered a Charitable donation, and you will be issued a tax receipt by CLEA upon receipt of your donation, which can be made on-line at www.charlestonlakeassociation. ca, or by cheque.

In recent weeks and months, your volunteer CLA and CLEA directors have been very hard at work on a range of initiatives including three I would like to call out here:

- Sustaining our Shoal Marker program. CLA director Robbie Gibson and his team installed some 75 Shoal Markers all around the lake. This year we replaced 26 buoys and exchanged or added 35 solar-powered lights. We extend our thanks to Robbie and his on-board and on-shore team of Marty Rukavina, Jordan Gibson-Banks, and Brody Knapp, who made it possible. You help make Charleston Lake a safer place for us to enjoy.
- Maintaining and installing Loon Nesting Rafts. CLA director Dwayne Struthers and his team maintain 7 rafts at different locations around the lake. A first for this year, our rafts now feature digital video cameras. Our Social Media team will post images from | Charleston Lake Association

- time to time on our Facebook and Instagram pages. And please do not approach the nesting rafts. We don't want the adults to flee the nest, leaving it vulnerable to predators.
- Supporting the Canada Day Celebration. The July celebration (this year being held on Saturday, June 29), is a highlight of the social calendar around the lake. This year, CLA is proud to support a live music venue at the Main Dock. Come on by and tap your foot to the sounds of a great local band, and meet and greet fellow Charleston Lake families.

As always, let me conclude by once again thanking you, our paying CLA members. Without your support, year after year, we could not do what we do. We are always looking for ideas and volunteers, so if you are passionate about something around the lake and want to work on it, do reach out to me or one of our Directors.

# FOR CHARLESTON LAKE: SPAWNING SANCTUARIES

There are now two spawning sanctuaries in Charleston Lake that went into effect this spring. The new regulations and the descriptions of the sanctuaries are included in the OMNRF's official 2024 Fishing Regulations. What is a spawning sanctuary? They are seasonally designated areas within a lake where all forms of fishing are prohibited during the critical period when fish such as largemouth and smallmouth bass are spawning and guarding their young. For the next two years, the no fishing regulations go from April 15 through the Friday before the first Saturday in July (in 2024, this will be on July 6).



The sanctuary boundaries in Charleston Lake where no fishing is allowed until July 6th are marked in the shaded areas on the map. White signs have also been placed along the shoreline within the sanctuaries to mark the areas.

#### **2023 LOON SURVEY SEASON**

During the 2023 season, three loon surveys were conducted between May and August. The largest presence observed was 6 chicks(loonlets) and 33 adult birds. Happily, all chicks observed survived the season. The survey was reported to Birds

Canada in September to help advance our understanding and conservation of these beautiful creatures.

In late March 2024, we began to hear reports of the first loons returning to their breeding grounds on Charleston Lake . In the weeks since, many more loons have been spotted. The first report of loons calling at night was on April 1 from a CLA member at the south end of the lake. This is early for our local loons and the nesting rafts had not been prepared or placed. Soon after, Dwayne Struthers was able to secure all of the rafts with help from a volunteer, Jeff Roddick. The wooden rafts of past years have a tendency to become waterlogged and heavy to move, so this year there is only one wooden refurbished raft. All the other rafts are newly fabricated or refurbished by Dwayne and Jeff, using PVC material. Seven rafts have been decorated with cedars and marsh grasses and one has a new canopy to protect from raptors. The most exciting news is that two of the rafts now have cameras to keep us informed of their nesting success. These have been supplied, installed and monitored through Joshua Burch with the company Reolink, which is located in the UK. We will have more to report in our next newsletter.

With loons returning and nesting season beginning, now is the time to discuss loon nesting habitat and the behaviours loons manifest to indicate that they need more space while on the nest. During the incubation period, loons will hold their heads upright when they feel relaxed. In contrast, when feeling threatened, they will flatten their bodies low over the nest and angle their heads toward the water. This helps minimize their appearance to hide from the threat and allows them an easy getaway into the water. If you see a loon in this position, please give it more space in order to ensure that it does not flush off the nest. If you accidentally flush a loon off its nest, leave the area immediately. Usually, a loon will return to its nest shortly after the perceived threat leaves the area.

Late June / early July is the peak hatch time for loon chicks on Charleston Lake. If you frequently visit our lake, keep your eyes peeled. You may get lucky and see one! If you do see a loonlet( chick), please let me know. I am always scouring the lake for new loon families, but would appreciate the extra eyes watching for them. #### Save Some Green!

#### WATER QUALITY 2023 FINAL RESULTS

Charleston Lake Association has been sampling water for over 20 years. Again in 2023 summer, forty-two phosphorus samples and water clarity recordings were collected over the period May 23th to October 23th inclusive; six samples from each of seven basins in the lake.

The 2023 total phosphorus from the MOECP Lake Partner Program showed a mean average of 9.14 ug/L compared to the average of the previous 5 test periods (2017-2022) of 9.07 ug/L. These levels are below (better) than the Provincial Water Quality Objective of 10 ug/L, and have been for over 10 years. The period of 2000-2004 had a whole lake mean value of 14.027 ug/L, so the last 10 years have shown a remarkable improvement. A big part of the initial improvement was the result of the zebra mussel colonization of the lake, but that appears to have been stable and/or declining for a number of years and the results continue to be stable. The mean values (2023) for the various basins are 8.24 Donaldson Bay, 8.91 Goose Island, 8.93 Eastern Water, 8.95 Webster Bay, 9.14 Big


Water, 9.71 Deep Water (Runnings Bay), 10.11 Southern Water

Charleston Lake has reached a steady-state equilibrium with respect to total phosphorus concentration for the period 2009- 2023 inclusive that clearly places Charleston Lake in the oligotrophic category for this parameter.

As reported in the last newsletter 2023 water clarity continued to improve with an average Secchi depth of 8.30m. Donaldson Bay had the highest average clarity at 9.37m, ranging to Southern Water at 7.42m average. Oligotrophic lakes have a water clarity > 5.0 metres.

The final 2023 report with more detailed results is posted on the website. Through a combination of good luck and good management we have seen Charleston Lake return to near pristine conditions from where it was a generation ago. We can't take it for granted but we can enjoy the result and do what we can to make sure it further improves.

#### **BOATING SAFETY**

At the start of a beautiful summer on the lake, boating safety should be foremost in our minds. The tragic accident at Bob's Lake on the May long weekend reminds us all that safe boating practices are very important.

Wearing life jackets or PDFs, conducting our boats in a safe manner and avoiding speeding as well as ensuring that we are especially careful after dark and have sufficient proper lighting are all things about which we should be diligent. And of course, avoiding boating while under the influence of drugs or alcohol. The legal speed limit is 10 kmh within 30m of shore.

### BOAT NOISE REGULATIONS

Current Transport Canada regulations require that a boat must be five nautical miles offshore to operate without a muffler. There is nowhere on Charleston Lake where a boat can legally operate without a muffler.

A proper muffler system blows exhaust from the engine through the propeller hub under the water.

The fine for operating a boat without a muffler is \$500.

#### LET'S GET THE LEAD OUT

CLEA is working hard again this year to "Get the Lead Out" of our beautiful lake. Lead is a deadly neurotoxin to fish, loons and other wildlife and is found in much of the fishing tackle used by anglers. Go to www.charlestonlakeassociation. ca to learn more. #### **OPEN-AIR BURNING**

Did you know that you need a permit to Open Air Burn in the Township? Permits are free to all residents of Leeds 1000 Islands Township. Permits need to be renewed each year and expire on December 31. Please visit Iti.burnpermits.com to register online or stop by the Township Office at 1233 Prince St. Once you have obtained your permit call (613) 704-1812 on each day you would like to burn to activate your permit for 24 hrs.

#### **ISLAND 911 ACCESS**

During a Life-threatening emergency seconds count especially with water access only properties. Being able to quickly identify your cottage from the water is crucial for first responders. Please ensure that your 911 number (blue Blade sign) is always visible from the water. Either attached securely to the end of your dock or posted at the main access point for your property. Please contact Amanda Werner-Mackeler at the Leeds 1000 Islands Township Office if you require a sign.

#### WHAT3WORDS

Have you ever been lost and tried to give someone directions to where you are? Emergency responders everywhere are encouraging the public to download the wat3words app to their phone. The what3words app replaces complicated GPS coordinates with 3 simple words. If you're ever in trouble open the app and simply give the emergency responders the 3 word combination for your specific location, example (denying.handrail.expert) and dispatchers can accurately locate your position. #### THANK YOU FOR ASKING

To CLA/CLEA,

Could someone tell me if we have sighted Water Soldier in Charleston Lake. A friend told me of efforts to control it in Red Horse Lake. Is it another invasive species like Zebra Mussels.

#### Answer

Water Soldier is an invasive aquatic perennial plant, native to Europe and Northeast Asia.

There are populations of this plant in the Trent-Severn waterway, Black River near Sutton Ontario and Red Horse Lake north of Gananoque. This is a bad news plant that is difficult to control. It is often used as an ornamental plant in water gardens and disposing of these plants into lakes is the most likely source of introduction. Once established, offsets (new shoots) produced by mature plants can detach from the main plant to produce new colonies. Water Soldier floats in the water and can form dense floating mats very quickly. Its leaves resemble those of a pineapple, floating above the water, bright green, sharp spines and sometimes white flowers with three petals.

Water Soldier can hinder recreational activities such as boating, angling and swimming.

There is an active crew that will be testing for and removing Water Soldier in Red Horse Lake this summer. Adjacent lakes – Singleton, Lyndhurst, Upper and Lower Beverly and Charleston Lake to be monitored this summer. No Water Soldier in Charleston Lake yet but its DNA has been detected.

There is a canoe portage between Red Horse Lake and Charleston Lake but not well used and according to OFAH and MNR+F is not a likely source of contamination.

The main way to control this invasive plant has been by pulling or digging it as it does not root well like other plants.


